Phillip Marlowe, (Dick Powell) visits a police station, badly beaten up, telling his story. He believes that he is charged with one or more of several murders. His story begins with a giant ex-convict named "Moose" Malloy (Mike Mazurki), who pays him to help him hunt for a one-time girl friend, Velma. First they go to Florian's, where eight years ago she

danced, but find no trace of Velma. Later, alone, Marlowe locates Mrs. Florian, who gives him a phony picture of Velma, but says she has no idea where she is. As soon as he leaves she makes a phone call. It brings Marlowe more business than he's had for months—but it's dangerous business. First Marriott (Douglas Walton) asks him to go with him to buy back a jade necklace from some crooks who have stolen it from a wealthy woman, Mrs. Grayle (Claire Trevor). On this trip he gets slugged to sleep and Marriott is killed by an unseen murderer. Then Ann Grayle (Anne Shirley), the rich man's daughter, tries to come between Marlowe and the truth, to protect her father. They fall in love. Marlowe escapes another trap set for him by Mrs. Grayle, and arranges a showdown meeting at the Grayle beach house. By this time he knows Mrs. Grayle is really the missing Velma. As "Moose" awaits a signal to come in and meet his Velma, Mrs. Grayle starts to shoot Marlowe and Ann, but is dropped dead, before she can fire, by bullets from Marlowe's gun in the hands of her own husband. Just then "Moose" barges in and the detective gets his eyes put out of commission, temporarily, by a pistol blast right past his nose. He's sure the police are pinning at least one of the

killings on him because his gun was used, but they fool him. After his statement has been

taken he is led to a taxicab by a police sergeant, and thinks he's being taken home by the

officer. Then he smells perfume. And asks for a kiss, recognizing Ann's. Soft shoulders, he decides, are good for a guy while waiting for his eyes to get back into shape.
